





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The Problem of Pain

Pain, unfortunately, is a universal reality on earth. Everybody has experienced pain; many have had severe and chronic pain. What was the worst pain you have experienced? Pain could be physical or emotional. Even God, in some sense, has emotional pain (Genesis 6:6). Pain is not pleasant, and chronic pain can be draining physically and psychologically.

Yet sometimes pain is a valuable thing for us. A book I read years ago was titled *The Gift of Pain* by Philip Yancey and Paul Brand (a Christian writer and doctor respectively). They explained: "Pain is the body's built-in warning system that something is wrong and needs to be fixed." The level and nature of the pain we have is essential for diagnosing the problem in our body which needs to be treated.

Pain also is frequently something God uses to help us grow spiritually and to draw us closer to Him. The apostle Paul prayed repeatedly that God would heal the "thorn in his flesh". But God told him that He was using that pain to keep Paul humble (but promises him sufficient grace and supernatural power to cope with it). James tells us to "Consider it pure joy whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance...." (James 1:2) The other New Testament writers express similar sentiments. Pain is unpleasant, but it is a powerful tool to shape us spiritually!

C.S. Lewis, in his classic book *The Problem of Pain*, wrestles with the

"philosophical and theological problem" of our pain in relation to God. Lewis asserts that "the problem of pain" in its simplest form is: *"If God were good, He would wish to make His creatures perfectly happy, and if God were almighty, He would be able to do what He wished. But the creatures are not happy. Therefore, God lacks either goodness, or power, or both."* He answers that question thoroughly in his book.

However, our struggles with pain typically take the simpler, more personal form of "Why does God allow me (or my loved one) to suffer?" As we all know, such a question is frequently impossible for us to answer. We are called to trust in God with our whole heart without leaning on our own understanding.

Four promises which have often helped anchor the souls of Christians for coping with and persevering through pain are these:

1. Compassion. God understands and cares! *1 Peter 5:7; Isaiah 66:13; John 11:33-35.

2. Sufficient Grace. He is present to give His adequate grace and strength to go on. *2 Cor 12:8-10; Heb 13:5b-6; Psalm 34:18.

3. Purpose. There is always a wise reason God allows us to have pain. Romans 8:28; Ephesians 1:11; Genesis 50:20.

4. Eternal Hope. "Pain has an expiration date." *Rev. 21:3-4. No more pain or sorrow for eternity!

The quote mentioned above, "Pain has an expiration date", is from Shelby Abbott, who has had severe, chronic pain much of his life. This has been very hard for him, but he is thankful that this has made his walk with the Lord stronger than ever before, and has shaped him as a child of God. So many in our church and other churches where I've served have expressed similar testimonies of God's grace carrying them and shaping them through the pain.

Joni Eareckson Tada is another example of one who has gone through much pain in her life, physically and emotionally, since her diving accident that paralyzed her as a teenager. Yet she now gives thanks for all the ways God has used that to shape her, and for the opportunities He continues to give her to minister to others who suffer. The metaphor in Psalm 72:6 (that the coming messianic king "will be

like rain falling on a mown field, like showers watering the earth") spoke to her of how God comes to us when we are "cut down" and how we need His refreshing grace to renew and refresh us. That is true for all of us who trust in the Lord in the midst of our struggles and pain.

I've had severe pain at certain points in my life, but so many others have had it more intensely. We can be God's instruments of encouragement and support to others, even though we can't fully understand their experience. Our love and care can be like rain on a mown field. I am eager to live in the new creation with no more pain, death or crying! And our Savior, who willingly suffered pain beyond what any of us will ever face, walks with us through our pain, sustaining, shaping and using us as His people, until the day He takes us to that glorious, painless new reality.

Tuesday Evening Ladies' Bible Study

This fall, we have begun a study of Jonah called, "Grace for Sinners and Saints". It is part of a series called, *The Gospel-Centered Life in the Bible*, which is published by New Growth Press. The lessons, written by Lain M. Duguid, Old Testament professor at Westminster Seminary, are designed to dig deeply with no homework preparation required. Creating a study with both of these elements is not easy to do as "no homework" studies often present light "share your opinion or thoughts" types of questions. But this is far from that! The lessons are set up to read together a brief introduction, the Scripture passage, and a

short article written by Dr. Duguid. Each of these sections are followed by a few discussion questions. We then have 10-15 minutes to complete an exercise on our own, after which we share some of what we learned with the group. We close with prayer and a song of worship.

The material is insightful, pastoral, and evangelical and constantly points us to the greater Jonah—our Lord Jesus Christ.

Administrative Board Notes

It is with great joy that we share the updates from the Administrative Board since our last newsletter in April. The board has been diligently overseeing the daily operations of our beloved church, ensuring its continued growth and vitality.

2024-2025 Church Budget

In May, the Administrative Board approved the 2024-2025 church budget drafted by the Finance Committee. This budget was presented to the congregation at the 2024 Congregational Meeting. A significant change has been made to the budgeting process - there will be no placeholder entries, ensuring the budget is as close to actual expenses as possible. The board has paid close attention to each budget item to ensure fiscal responsibility.

Mission, Vision, and Values

In June, the board held a special meeting to learn about the progress of the meetings between Pastors Rod, Steve, and Dan Quagliata. We learned about the Mission, Vision, and Values for the church that have been developed and were presented to the congregation at the Annual Congregational Meeting in June. The result of the work was evident this summer and fall with the various activities and events that have brought our community together, such as the Ice Cream Social, Vacation Bible School, Car Show, and Back-to-School activities.

Facility Improvements

The board approved necessary repairs to the Educational Building roof, the roof over the front main entrance, and the left side roof tower in the front of the church. After getting several bids we were able to have all 3 repairs done at the same time for a discounted price.

Financial Stewardship

Unfortunately, the Finance Committee has reported that collections are below budget. As we enter the second quarter of the 2024-2025 fiscal year, we kindly ask for your help in bringing our collections up to date. Your faithful giving is crucial in ensuring the continued ministry and outreach of MPCRC.

Music Director Search

The search for a new music director is still ongoing, and we do not have a candidate currently. We are committed to finding the right individual who will lead our music ministry with passion and excellence. We appreciate your patience and prayers as we continue this search.

We would like to remind the congregation to maintain their levels of giving, either online or through the next week's offering. It is important that we continue to meet our operating financial obligations. Your faithful giving ensures the sustainability of our ministries.


ing up. Thank you to Jim Trommelen who planned and organized the show.

Pumpkin Bread

3½ cups flour
1 cup oil
2 tsp. baking soda
4 eggs 1 ½ tsp. salt
2/3 cups water
2 cups canned pumpkin
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. nutmeg
3 cups sugar

Stir together dry ingredients and mix well.

Add all remaining ingredients.

Grease and flour two loaf pans.

Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes at 350 degrees.

The virtues of gratefulness and generosity are connected. When we're truly thankful for all God provides, we want to sow generous seeds in other people's lives. What will be the harvest?
